


There are TWO Fellowships on offer in this round of funding in partnership with Hunter Medical Research Institute, and John Hunter Hospital Charitable Trust. The total available funding involves provision for salary and research support costs up to \$150,000/per year over a 3 year period to allow Fellows to engage in relevant health service/clinical research and related professional development opportunities.

EFFECTIVENESS of CLADRIBINE tablets for MS

An international collaboration of researchers found that cladribine tablets, an oral disease-modifying treatment (DMT) for multiple sclerosis, were associated with a significantly greater real-world treatment persistence and more favourable relapse outcomes than all oral DMT comparators.

HOW PHYSIOS and OTs are helping LONG COVID sufferers

While there is no "one size fits all" treatment for long COVID, there is increasing recognition of the importance of allied health professionals such as physiotherapists and occupational therapists in providing treatment for people throughout various stages of COVID. These experts can tailor exercise training, breathing techniques and ways to manage fatigue safely, to help people get back to their normal roles and routines. Read more in The Conversation...

REVIEW: LONG COVID in AUSTRALIA



This review from the AIHW investigates the impact of long COVID in the Australian context. The authors found:

- around 5–10% of COVID-19 cases in Australia reported symptoms persisting for more than 3 months
- up to Sept 2022, most long COVID research has been conducted outside Australia, using pre-Omicron data
- two COVID-19 vaccination doses are associated with a 13-47% lower risk of symptoms persisting beyond 4 weeks

MJA CHRISTMAS COMPETITION

The winning entry in the annual MJA Christmas competition includes local talent (and an offbeat topic): a new faecal assessment scale based on chocolate! The Bristol Stool Scale is used widely to assess changes in stool form that indicate diarrhoea or constipation. The stool form score is correlated with objective measures of colonic transit. Children, however, may not understand the scale as well as adults do, so the proposed alternative has merit, despite being somewhat disturbing...
