





WHAT WORKS FOR ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER MEN?

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men experience significantly higher rates of suicide, trauma, alcohol related deaths and unemployment than other Australian men. Despite significant levels of government intervention, rates of family violence, unemployment and incarceration continue to increase in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. This systematic review seeks to understand what interventions, programs and activities are successful in improving the wellbeing of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men and thereby the wellbeing of their communities.



WE NEED TO CHAT ABOUT ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

The authors of [this recent article in the Medical Journal of Australia](#) argue that using artificial intelligence (AI) effectively in healthcare will require retraining of the workforce, retooling health services, and transforming workflows. They believe it is vital to develop standards for AI tools that impact diagnosis and treatment of patients.



To that end, they have created the [Australian Alliance for AI in Healthcare](#) (AAAIH), a national collective of over 100 national and international partners and stakeholders in academia, government, consumer, clinical, industry organisations, and peak bodies. AAAiH has created [A Roadmap for AI in Healthcare for Australia](#), containing 24 recommendations across eight priority areas, covering critical issues such as safety, quality and ethics, industry development and consumer needs. Led by Enrico Coiera, Professor of Medical Informatics at Macquarie University, AAAiH has called on the Australian Government to develop clear plans and regulations for AI.

WHY NATURE will NOT ALLOW the use of GENERATIVE AI in IMAGES and VIDEO

"The process of publishing — as far as both science and art are concerned — is underpinned by a shared commitment to integrity. That includes transparency. As researchers, editors and publishers, we all need to know the sources of data and images, so that these can be verified as accurate and true. Existing generative AI tools do not provide access to their sources so that such verification can happen... Saying 'no' to this kind of visual content is a question of research integrity, consent, privacy and intellectual-property protection." SOURCE: [Nature 618, 214 \(2023\)](#)

The NSW Emergency Psychiatry Network has been established by psychiatrists delivering services in the ED to drive closer collaboration between the psychiatric community, Emergency Medicine and ACEM, government and other stakeholders – to build a culture that puts patients first and urges investment in frameworks for research and evidence-based clinical care for patients with psychiatric symptoms in EDs across Australia.

Common ORTHOPAEDIC TRAUMA may explain PREHISTORIC remains

The fascinating discovery of skeletal remains in Borneo of an individual with absent left distal tibia, fibula and foot from 31,000 years ago has been proposed as evidence of a contemporaneous sophisticated amputation procedure. This item from local authors proposes that the skeletal findings in fact show the natural history of an injury pattern commonly encountered in blunt orthopaedic trauma, an open distal tibia/fibula fracture with growth-plate involvement.

SPORTS INJURY in AUSTRALIA



NEW SCORING SYSTEMS

The production of RCTs and guidelines is a complex task, and there are a multitude of methods, some more rigorous than others. TRIP aims to help users make sense of the evidence-base by creating new scoring graphics. The [RCT score](#) transforms the likely risk of bias (RoB) into a linear scale.

The [guideline score](#) has been improved to help users understand how robust a guideline might be.
